


You Are Cordially Invited to...

Former Mayor Steve Williams began work on the Women’s History Month street banner program in April 2024 after attending the Women’s History Month Banner program initiated by the Huntington Area League of Women Voters. The work has continued and has received strong support from Mayor Farrell.

A diverse committee of nine women was formed to select the 90 women who would be honored with banners. The committee included the following individuals: Dr. Hilary Brewster, an English professor and Director of the Women’s, Gender, and Sexuality Studies Program at Marshall University; former Huntington City Councilwoman Sandra Clements; Laura Deveny, an author and retired Cabell County teacher; Amanda Kolling, a senior program director with Resource Media, a national nonprofit communications consulting firm; Huntington City Councilwoman Ally Layman; Dr. Montserrat Miller, Executive Director of Marshall University’s John Deaver Drinko Academy; Huntington City Councilwoman Holly Smith Mount; Phoebe Patton Randolph, Principal and President of Edward Tucker Architects; and Wendy Thomas, a retired Cabell County teacher and Co-President of the Huntington Area League of Women Voters.

The committee selected honorees including artists, authors, educators, entrepreneurs, and community volunteers, athletes and elected officials.

LWV Federal Judiciary Survey

Per the LWVUS Website this survey is *"To develop a LWV position on the Federal Judiciary as an essential component of US democracy. The study's purpose includes, but is not limited to, addressing concerns and clarifying judicial accountability, transparency, independence, and ethics. The scope addresses the Supreme Court as well as the other Article III federal courts."*

There are 12 questions that will be discussed to create a consensus that will in turn be submitted via *one form* by a local league representative for review by the LWVUS. A finalized position will be developed which will be announced at LWVUS Council June 26-28, 2025.

Although the questions may seem simple, the study guide reveals they deserve serious thought.

WASHINGTON — Today, the League of Women Voters of the United States CEO **Celina Stewart** issued the following statement in response to actions taken by the new administration and the impact on voters.

“In the first 17 days of the Trump administration, we’ve witnessed nothing short of the weaponization of government against Americans. The callousness of the most recent actions, including the terrorizing of the immigrant community, shows a blatant disregard for the well-being of the American people. We’ve seen the weakening of the Department of Justice’s civil rights work, continued attacks on people of color and the LGBTQIA+ community, and the elimination and freezing of humanitarian aid to other countries. These efforts are dangerous for our country, compromising our international ally relationships and putting many Americans’ livelihoods at stake.

“As an organization committed to empowering voters and defending democracy, the League is outraged by the current administration’s actions against the American people. We are equally concerned about the inaction of our elected officials in Congress to exercise their constitutional authority and put a stop to this attack on democratic institutions, Americans, and the rule of law.

“Over the past few weeks, we’ve witnessed a number of alarming actions from the executive branch met with little response from our elected officials in Congress. All members of Congress have a responsibility to serve the people they represent and swear to support and defend the Constitution of the United States. Congress is undermining the system of checks and balances upon which this country was founded by not responding to the executive branch’s violation of the law and encroachment on its authority. We call on Congress to act now to stop the infringement on its legislative authority and respond to the ongoing assault on our democracy on behalf of the American people.

“For over a century, the League has remained steadfast in our commitment to the American people and our democracy. President Trump’s latest actions put both in deep jeopardy. We call on our elected officials to stand up to tyranny, protect our democracy, and honor their oath to the American people.”

“The **totalitarian** government uses ideology to control most aspects of human life, such as the political economy of the country, the system of education, the arts, the sciences, and the private-life morality of the citizens.^[4] In the exercise of socio-political power, the



difference between a totalitarian regime of government and an authoritarian regime of government is one of degree; whereas totalitarianism features a charismatic dictator and a fixed worldview, **authoritarianism** only features a dictator who holds power for the sake of holding power, and is supported, either jointly or individually, by a military junta and by the **socio-economic elites** who are the ruling class of the country.^[5]"

The Demise of Digital Self-Sovereignty

Our Democracy represents human beings, not pieces of lifeless data to be filtered and scrubbed. Yet, we now see that in the eyes of the current executive overreach that one's worth is no more than just that, a soulless piece of a puzzle. The self-sovereignty of the digital footprint that leads to one's identification, health and finances is an assumed privacy that can no longer be taken for granted. Sensitive government databases, once thought to be secure, are now the subject of surgery under the scalpel of AI. What qualifies as authorization to conduct operations to feed our government data into new programs is not fully understood by the public, but the dangers of doing so are definitely being acknowledged.

Reasonable standards of review would entail a transparent plan with the approval of Congress to determine the best practices to apply when calculating government efficiency. The damage now being done independently by a lawless executive branch power grab may end up being permanent. Without debate, untested and unproven, the strategies we are witnessing are something that our Democracy has never seen before. Those in solidarity with the actions being taken by the current administration should be providing WV citizens with answers, not touting the approach of a pending ‘golden age’ that will be the result of a total disregard for our entire system of government.
